Mayor's Message



Subelieve there is no more critical task for a governing body than the adoption of the budget. Over the past ten years, the overriding focus of this Mayor and Council has been to fashion a budget which is fiscally

prudent within the overall context of managing our community. It is important to remember that one of the major components of managing the business of a Borough is truly a FINANCIAL one, and must always be looked upon from that perspective. Goals such as preserving open space, sharing services with neighboring communities, or providing our blue chip library with the necessary resources to renovate their building, are all viewed in the context of their present, and future, financial implications. This administration has not, nor will we ever, compromise our long term financial health for short term political gains.

During January, February and March, the Council and I have worked diligently together at numerous budget sessions. Last December, in preparation for the budget process, each department received a letter from me requesting that its operating budget would be reduced by 5% from the previous year. Unfortunately, even though a good start, we found this would not be enough. As the process started in January, we learned that the town's revenues were considerably lower than in previous years. Our interest income from investments was down

dramatically (due to declining interest rates) while building permits also collapsed as fewer people renovated their homes than in the previous year. At that point, we quickly realized that we would have to reduce expenses much more than anticipated. The first step we took was to review every departmental request (including capital items which are needed to maintain our first rate services) and to meet with the heads of our various departments, boards, committees and commissions.

At the same time, we met with representatives from both the Police Department and the DPW to see if there was a way in which we could change the structure of their impending salary increase, to something that was more akin to the financial problems that are occurring today. After numerous sessions between us we decided, as their contract expires at the end of the year, that it would be best to take a fresh look during the fourth quarter to hammer out a contract that would be mutually beneficial. I would like to thank them however, for their work, and willingness, throughout the entire process.

With the assistance of our Chief Financial Officer, Rebecca Overgaard, as well as our Municipal Accountant, Jeff Bliss, we have fashioned a budget for the year 2009 which will yield a slight municipal tax increase. This increase will total \$64 annually (or 3.7%), for a home ASSESSED at \$622,000. Each and every council person deliberated long and hard about the merit of increasing taxes slightly given the current economic environment that we are confronted with. In the end, we felt that since we already cut so much from the budget that, by not increasing taxes just a bit, we would have had a much more serious problem going into 2010, particularly if the economy continues to meander along at a "repression" like pace. As hopefully you can see, the

short term and long term financial well being of this municipality (and consequently, your financial well being as a homeowner and taxpayer) is uppermost in our minds.

In 2008, the breakdown of your tax bill was as follows:

- 14% for municipal services, which includes the operation of the Police Department and the Department of Public Works, the Borough's professionals, the Borough's many boards and commissions, the equipment utilized to ensure that our streets and roads are maintained properly, the administration of the Borough, as well as funding for the Library. This is what your Mayor and Council is responsible for.
- 73% for the elementary schools and high school, which is determined by the local and regional boards and voted on in April. The Borough of Old Tappan merely COLLECTS the tax.
- 13% for the County Tax, which is determined by the County government. The Borough of Old Tappan merely COL-LECTS the tax.

Hence, only \$14 out of every \$100 of your tax dollars paid for all the services provided by the Borough.

<u>GENERAL ELECTION</u>: Tuesday, November 3rd – 6:am - 8pm

Last day to register to vote in the General Election is Tuesday, October 13th. The Municipal Clerk's office will remain open on Tuesday, October 13th until 9:00 p.m.

The Bergen County Board of Elections issues voter Registration Cards.

If you are going to be out of town on Election Day, you may pick up an absentee ballot application at the Borough Clerk's Office. The <u>County Clerk</u> must receive applications by mail no later than 7 days prior to Election Day. <u>After the 7 day</u>

deadline all applications must be hand delivered to the County Clerk.

A Message from Police Chief Joseph Fasulo.....

Hopefully we've made it out of the cold and into a warmer season by the time this newsletter reaches your home. As with the arrival of spring in town come added ventures to the parks and schools. Please be aware of children in both of these areas. Over the past several

months I have noticed a marked increase in parents only dropping their children off in front of the TBD School which causes a great amount of traffic congestion. A large amount of this traffic could be eliminated if parents with older children would consider dropping off at the DeBerg Drive entrance. Parents traveling from the east have the option of turning down Russell Avenue, Leonard Drive or Charles Place to Irving Street to DeBerg Drive. Parents coming from the west would follow Washington Avenue to Lachmund Court to DeBerg Drive. As always, please obey the School Marshals and do not double park.

If you are planning a much needed vacation please notify the Police Department if you would like your home checked. Always let someone know when you are away and make arrangements to have the mail and papers picked up or stopped.

Over the years we have all heard of various internet and telephone scams that continue to thrive. I personally have found that a website, <u>www.snopes.com</u> keeps track of most current ones. It is unfortunate how many people fall victim to these scams each year and that most are embarrassed to report it. Please notify our officers if you have any doubts about someone wanting to give you something for nothing, it just doesn't happen.

Please remember that Speed is the number one violation that we see in our neighborhoods. Unfortunately the number one violators in our neighborhoods are our neighbors. Please make a concerted effort to be cognizant of the 25 MPH speed limit in all residential areas. Residents may again begin parking over night in the streets after April 1st. However we encourage you to still use your driveways as suspicious cars are easily spotted when the streets are empty and children riding bicycles and motorists have a better view of each other so that no one gets into an accident.



The Old Tappan Police Department proudly welcomed Gene Wilkins on January 5th, 2009, as the new member on our force. Gene was born and raised in River Vale, entered the coast guard after high school graduation and spent 6 years active duty with the helicopter squadron and presidential honor guard. He later put himself through the Cape May County Police Academy alternate route program.

Officer Wilkins was a much needed addition to our force. In September of 2008, Sgt. Charles Anders retired after 25 years of service. Shortly after that Officer Katie Weaver informed the department that she was pregnant. On October 30, 2008, she was removed from the schedule and was not allowed any patrol duties. In order to run law enforcement matters, routine patrol duties, emergency medical responses, and the multitude of services provided by the police department, there needs to be at minimum 13 officers. As of November of 2008, our police department was at 11. Officer Wilkins' hiring has helped put our police department back on schedule.






What is the value of your library card?

As of December 2008, 87% of our residents have library cards. 

A Message from Fire Chief & Fire Marshal Nicola Lepore.....

Approximately 1500 people die annually from CO poisoning. CO enters our body through normal breathing. Once inside our body CO quickly bonds to the hemoglobin in our blood denying oxygen molecules the opportunity to attach. Essentially, our body starves as less oxygen is allowed to make its way to our organs. Excessive CO concentrations in our blood can lead to lead to irreversible brain damage and death. In fact, CO poisoning is the principle reason people die in building fires rather than succumbing to the actual heat of the fire.

Fortunately we, we do have an easy defense to combat the possibility of CO affecting our families in our homes, *purchasing and installing a CO detector*. CO detectors can be purchased at any local discount or home improvement store and

range in cost from 25 to 60 dollars. It is important to know that all CO detectors operate and alarm using the same detection principle so extra cost usually translates to extra features, not more protection. I recommend purchasing CO detectors that plug in to a wall outlet and have a battery backup to provide detection during power outages.

CO detectors work on saturation. This means they need to be installed in an area with little or no air movement. It is best to follow local codes and manufacturers installation instructions when choosing a location to avoid false alarms.

Because CO in neutrally buoyant it is recommended to avoid purchasing combined CO and smoke alarms as this type force you to mount the detector at ceiling level. These detectors will not provide as much comprehensive protection as a detector that is plugged into a wall outlet at floor level where most sources of CO are found.

Studies have shown that children (under 8 years of age) and seniors (over age of 55) are ten times more susceptible to the affects of CO, so it may be a good idea to install CO detectors in bedrooms and nurseries.

Five easy steps to Carbon Monoxide Safety:

- Check the color of the flame of your gas appliances. Anything other than blue needs immediate attention, Have all gas appliances checked annually by a certified contractor
- Check all exhausts and flues from gas appliances or chimneys. Be sure they are not blocked by dirt, debris, leaves, animal nests and snow
- Do you or your family members have any unexplained illness? Flu like symptoms including fatigue, muscle pains, upset stomach, lethargy, dizziness, headaches or reddening of the skin.
- Do not operate any vehicles, gas BBQ's or gas heaters in garages without adequate ventilation. Do not warm your car in garage.
- Install a Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detector. Maintain the detector semi annually with fresh batteries and cleaning

If anyone in your family suffers from any symptoms of CO poisoning or your detectors sounds a continuous alarm, immediately evacuate the premises and move to an area with fresh air.

Remember, CO cannot be seen, smelled or tasted so do not rely on your senses to determine whether the alarm is false or real.

Once you and your family are safely evacuated, call 911 and let the Fire Department investigate the alarm for you. The Old Tappan Fire Department has equipment to test the CO level in your home. Do not return to the premises until the fire department or a representative form the gas company tells you that it is all right to go back inside. If you have any questions or concerns regarding carbon monoxide or co detectors, please feel free to contact my office.

Safety tips to remember:

- Change batteries in your smoke detectors when you change your clocks.
- If you have a wood burning fireplace or stove, be sure to have the chimney cleaned and inspected for cracks before using them.
- Having your furnace and or boiler serviced before the heating season to ensure proper operation, this could be a source of carbon monoxide if not serviced properly.
- Be sure your homes have a clear and visible house number. If we cannot find your address we could waste precious time when responding to your home with a fire truck or ambulance.

Once again, feel free to contact me at my office or Fire Headquarters for any fire safety related questions and concerns.

PUBLIC HEALTH UPDATE ... SWINE INFLUENZA A

CDC, Centers for Disease Control, has announced confirmation of 21 human cases of infection with Swine Influenza A (H1N1) in the United States, none of them in NJ. Case counts are updated daily and are available on the CDC website. CDC goals right now are to reduce transmission and illness severity. Northwest Bergen Regional Health Commission, which is the local health department for your community, is in contact with the State Health Department which is watching for any new cases or indications of an outbreak. There is a national stockpile of antiviral drugs, gloves and masks which will be released as needed.

Flu viruses are spread from person to person through coughing or sneezing of people with influenza. Sometimes people may become infected by touching contaminated surfaces and then touching their eyes, nose or mouth. The symptoms of swine flu are similar to seasonal flu and include fever, lack of appetite, coughing, and fatigue. Some people have also reported having a sore throat nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea. If you are ill with these symptoms and are concerned, please contact your health care provider.

To protect yourself from the Swine Flu, wash your hands frequently, avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth, and stay 4-6 feet away from people who are coughing or sneezing. To prevent the spread of germs, cough or sneeze into the crook of your elbow or cover your nose and mouth with a tissue. Wash your hands as soon as you throw your tissue away. When you are sick, stay home, and don't go to work or school, or run errands until you have felt well for two days. You cannot get swine flu from eating pork or pork products. There are no special recommendations for those who own a pig or are in contact with them frequently. This situation is developing rapidly and we will keep you informed as soon as new information becomes available.
